Honoring our Veterans:

The living Bridge Between Past and Future

A student once challenged me with a profound question: "Does history really matter?" They argued that while history maps our past, it doesn't guide our future. This struck me deeply, as it challenges the very essence of Judaism and our connection to our roots.

As Jews, we're intimately woven into the fabric of our history. It's why we felt such a profound connection to the land of Israel that, against all odds, we renewed our sovereign bonds with the land even after two millennia of absence. It's why we invoke Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel, and Leah in our prayers. It's why, every spring, we relive our ancestors' journey from slavery to freedom. So, if history doesn't matter, does Judaism matter?

I'm thinking about this question as we approach Veterans Day. Veterans Day isn't just another date on the calendar. It's a powerful reminder of the sacrifices made for our freedom and security we often take for granted. So, on November 7th, I'll be leading a special Friday night service - to be followed by a delicious congregational dinner at Torat Yisrael to honor our veterans! We'll gather to honor the veterans in our family and in our community, to hear their stories of valor, and to remember those whose memories we hold dear. Our gathering will be a moment when the past, present, and future converge, reminding us that history matters.

I think about what it must be like to watch your child, your spouse, your sibling risk everything for something greater than themselves. This level of sacrifice embodies values that transcend time. It's a testament to the enduring power of courage, loyalty, and selflessness - principles modeled by those who came before us and put everything on the line.

One of the Torah's most profound mitzvot is for children to honor their father and mother. But in Hebrew, the words for "father" and "mother" also mean "ancestors," as if to say that our fathers and mothers are the living bridge between the past and the future. When children honor their parents, they honor their entire lineage and the values that transcend time. Similarly, when we honor our veterans who protected our past and guard our future, we honor the ideas and values that make our country great.

That's why I urge you, with all my heart, to seek out a veteran. Engage them in conversation. Listen to their experiences with an open mind and a compassionate spirit. These aren't just stories - they're living history, a testament to the human capacity for sacrifice and courage. For those who can, I invite you to share these stories at our Shabbat honoring veterans because history isn't just a map of the past - it's a guide illuminating our path forward. So, on Friday, November 7th let's create a tapestry of memories, honoring those who've given so much for our freedom.

May God bless our veterans, the living bridge between our country's past, present, and future.

I find the Fall holiday season exhausting. The High Holidays demand their share of time in the synagogue and time to reflect on the significance of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Then there's 25 hours of fasting, followed shortly after by the building of a sukkah.

There is an intense physical and emotional shift. The quick shift from solemn to joyous observance was more dramatic this year, given the promise of a cease-fire between Israel and (which while fragile, is holding at the time of this writing) and the promise of the return of the

bodies of remaining hostages. As frenetic as that time seemed to me, I was so very impressed by Rabbi Sak's energy at the Saturday morning service on October 18, when he combined a Shabbat service with observance of Shemini Atzeret (including Yizkor) and Simchat Torah (including dancing with two of our Torahs). And, he did it all in less than 3 hours.

The Rabbi launched his Judaism 101 discussion series by Zoom on October 27th. During much of that time, he gave the participants an overview of the series. If you were unable to participate but are interested in joining the remaining sessions (the next one is on November 3rd), you will not be behind. I hope to see you there.

The Capital Campaign team is regrouping. If you have not been contacted already, they will be reaching out to you over the next few weeks. As you've heard several times before, it is so important that we retire our mortgage as soon as possible to ensure that Temple Torat Yisrael is here to serve the Jewish community for generations to come. Please, if you are not available to answer your phone when a team member calls, return the call. Even if you are unable to contribute, we would like to speak with you about the ways in which the synagogue serves you and could better do so.

And while I'm on the subject of raising funds, please get your Kol Nidre pledges to the office if you have not already done so. The people who have offered to match your contributions are eager to know how much they will be contributing.

Capital Campaign

Our Capital Campaign goal is to raise \$1,000,000 to reduce our mortgage. We know that we have a tall challenge to reach that goal. With the support of our congregants and the hard work of the Capital Campaign Committee members our goal is obtainable. To eliminate TTY's structural deficit, we need to reduce the mortgage on the building. The reduced interest expense and principal payments will eliminate our deficit and reduce our cash flow requirements.

Your support to place the Temple in a strong financial condition is priceless. Your commitment is critical to the continued long-term success of Torat Yisrael. By donating to the Campaign, you will

leave a legacy for our Synagogue and a home for worship and social gatherings for the Jewish community. Be as generous as you can to place Torat Yisrael on a strong financial footing for now and for the future.

Besides donating to the Capital Campaign by check, direct transfers to the Temple from one's retirement account may satisfy the donor's required annual minimum distribution. Donations of marketable securities allow the donor to receive a tax deduction at the current fair market value of the donated securities without having to recognize any income tax gain between the original cost of the securities and its fair market value on the date of transfer. Donors of appreciated securities may receive a charitable deduction on their individual income tax return if the amount of their donations exceed the minimum deductible threshold set by the IRS. Even if one is not able to take advantage of a charitable deduction, any gain on the direct transfer to the Temple of marketable securities having a current market value more than their original cost is not recognized by the donor.

Our goal is attainable with your support. Members of the Capital Campaign are reaching out to all the congregants. Please answer their calls, meet with them and hear our need. We need everyone's support to reach our goal. Together we are stronger.


